Course Number and Title: ARCH 156 / Graphic Communications I / 3.0 Credits

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Course Pre-requisite: ARCH 155

Schedule: Winter Term, Tuesday (Section 1) or Thursday (Section 2) 7:00 – 9:50pm

Catalog Description: Examines techniques of visual communications for use in the architectural design process. Focuses on architectural representation through advanced drawing techniques including sketching, perspective drawing, rendering, shade and shadow techniques and the use of color.

Course Objectives: As the second hand drawing course in the required course sequence for evening architecture majors, this course aims to broaden students' knowledge of representation techniques through the use and application of techniques discussed in Basic Architectural Drawing Arch 155. All projects in Arch 152 will deal with the observation and documentation of real spaces and conditions in an effort to better understand and explore the effects of light, materiality, color and texture upon space and the human experience. Outcomes from this class are intended to be transferred to your own design decisions.

Course Requirements: Students are expected to complete all work for the week as outlined in each assignment handout and to be prepared to discuss it with the group. Students should come to class prepared to work and have access to all drawing supplies in the studio. It will also be useful to have the course textbooks available for reference during in-class work sessions.

Sketchbook: You must bring your sketchbook and drawing supplies to every class meeting (graphite pencils and ink - special supply requirements will be discussed in class). Treat your sketchbook like a journal and use it as a testing ground for design ideas from studio, techniques discussed in drawing class, and drawn observations of the world around you. You will receive a grade on your sketchbook.

Course Supplies:

- Surface to lean on: 12"x18" cardboard or masonite
- Viewfinder: 7"x9" cardboard or chipboard (TBA)

Failure to pass this evaluation will result in a reduction of the final grade or class failure in extreme cases. When missing class, it is the student's responsibility to obtain the assignment from the course website and complete the necessary work for the following week.

Draft a section and partial plan of the Fisher Fine Arts Library Main and Rotunda Reading Rooms.

Week 2: Project 2, Assignment 2a, Constructing Shadows in Plan and Section

Construct and projected shadows on trace paper as an overlay on Assignment 1.

Week 3: Project 2, Assignment 2b, Rendering Shadows in Plan and Section

Render projected shadows using the technique of rendered tone. Test rendering technique in class.

Week 3: Project 2, Assignment 3, Drawing with Light (complete in class)

Rendering with light media on dark paper and dark media on white paper with a focus on form

Journal: TBA

Week 4: Project 2, Assignment 4, Detail Drawing Observation

Render in light and dark media to illustrate your observations of the form of details in response to light and shade. *Note: bring viewfinder to class next week!*

Week 5: Project 3, Assignment 1, Sketching with a Viewfinder

Select views of interior spaces and re-present them with the aid of a viewfinder

Journal: Three views sketched with shade and shadow annotated on drawings; develop tonal gradient

Week 6: Project 3, Assignment 2, Rendering a Drawing with cross hatching in ink

Using the technique of cross hatch, enlarge sketches and develop drawings through black ink rendering. Journal: Tonal gradient with cross-hatch

Week 7: Project 4, Assignment 1, Representing Materiality

Study of found objects; Developing a color palette with a focus on materials. Journal: Color Palette; freehand observation drawings from site visit

Note: bring your color pencils to class this week!

Week 8: Project 4, Assignment 2, Site Plan and Elevation Drawing with Color, Shade and Shadow

Site visit to Skirkanich Hall (33rd Street, south of Walnut, on the U.Penn Campus) Study of Skirkanich Hall in Plan and Elevation Begin drafting the elevation and site plan in 2D using the drawings provided *Journal: Developing components- people and trees*

Week 9: Project 4, Assignment 3, Color Rendering

Development of drawings and renderings, adding people and trees Journal: Rendering tests for final composition

Week 10: Project 4, Assignment 4, Composition Completion; Presentation of Journal

Final review of drawings Journal: Summary of course
